The project will aim to lay the foundations for a macro-regional strategy for the North Sea. Since the publication of the European Union's Integrated Maritime Policy (IMP), the concept of the regional management of sea basins has become a prominent topic for policy makers. A strategy for the Baltic Sea has already been developed by the European Commission, with the Mediterranean and Arctic regions other priority regions for macro-regional strategies. Local and regional authorities in the North Sea region are looking to secure a macro-regional strategy for the North Sea and are working in partnership with other stakeholders to lobby the European Commission to adopt such a document. In order to achieve this, we need to articulate what we would like to see included in a North Sea Strategy. In common with the principles of the IMP, the Lisbon and Gothenburg agendas, this proposal must be based on sound social, economic and environmental knowledge and data to be effective.

## 2. PROJECT IDEA INFORMATION

### 2.1 MAIN GENERAL CHARACTERISTICS / FEATURES OF THE TERRITORY TO BE ADDRESSED

The territory to be addressed is the INTERREG North Sea Region programme area, as well as coastal areas of France and the UK which border the North Sea and English Channel. The territory is relatively prosperous, but also diverse given its large scale. Population density is high in regions such as S.E. England & the Netherlands, yet extremely sparse in areas such as the Highlands & Islands of Scotland & Northern Norway. There are large urban conurbations & also predominately rural areas. The common territorial characteristic of the area is the coastal nature of these regions. Less tangible commonalities include a shared culture, heritage & industrial ties, which are no less important considerations when developing a common vision. The main challenges identified are climate change, governance of the sea, accessibility, demography, environmental protection & sustainable communities. Economic opportunities can emerge from challenges and should be supported by a North Sea Strategy.

Given the likelihood of rising sea levels, coastal protection will become an increasing challenge. Climate change could also threaten the viability of fish stocks and the communities whose livelihood depends on them. Such changes need to be managed through better governance, as do the increasingly-diverse range of activities carried out at sea. While some areas of the North Sea region are well-connected to the core of the EU, others are not. Links across the region also require improvement to develop a more coherent macro-region. Opportunities can emerge from these challenges, with the offshore renewable energy potential of the North Sea a possible means of mitigating the worst effects of climate change and reducing Europe's dependency on imported energy. New technologies need to be developed and there is great intellectual potential in the region which can be better capitalised upon. The shipping sector could also prosper through the modal shift of transportation to the sea.

### 2.2 SCOPE AND RATIONALE OF THE PROPOSED ACTION

#### 2.2.1 MAIN KNOWLEDGE NEED (max. 5000 characters)

A wide range of knowledge is required to inform the development of a North Sea Strategy. This does not need to be overly deep or detailed but should aim to provide a broad picture of the social, economic and environmental status of the North Sea region. Data should also assist policy makers to develop a strategy for the medium to long term (e.g up to 2020 to tie in with the lifespan of the Norvision document). Such information should also allow a degree of comparison with other areas of the EU, given the proliferation of macro-regional strategies and to assist the European Commission should they agree to produce a North Sea strategy.

Social information required would include data on demography, particularly relating to the ageing of the population and migration processes, both of which will affect the long-term sustainability of coastal communities in the North Sea region. The potential impact of climate change on these patterns would be of interest to stakeholders. Information on the importance of maritime industries and activities to coastal communities and European society as a whole would also be desirable.

Economic information required would include a comparative analysis of a wide range of economic data, including productivity, gross domestic product, competitiveness, research and innovation with the rest of Europe. The importance of maritime industries to the economy of the North Sea region would be of particular interest, hence it would also be useful to identify the contribution of the maritime economy to the wider North Sea region economy. The accessibility of the region to key markets in Europe and beyond is also likely to be a key concern of any future strategy, hence information on this would be welcomed. The focus of this information would be to identify areas with the greatest growth potential with a view to developing the maritime economic sectors of the North Sea region.

Environmental information required would be the collation of data on the environmental status of the sea, ideally compatible with the Marine Strategy Framework Directive. Information on the likely effects of climate change on the North Sea region would also be desirable, particularly with regards to its potential impact on coastal erosion, the environmental status of the sea and the economy of the North Sea region.

#### **2.2.2 POLICY AND/OR METHODOLOGICAL ISSUES TO BE ADRESSED (max. 2000 characters)**

Where possible and for the compatibility of data, it would be useful if the chosen methodologies were compatible with that used as the basis for existing key European policies. Of particular importance are the Integrated Maritime Policy and its related actions, the Lisbon and Gothenburg Agendas. Other key policies include the Common Fisheries Policy, Cohesion Policy (particularly territorial co-operation) and the Marine Strategy Framework Directive. It is important that a strategy for the North Sea takes account of these policies and also national, regional and local strategies, hence the chosen methodology should take multilevel governance into account where possible and relevant.

The Norvision document and its subsequent Synthesis Report (all produced through funding by the INTERREG North Sea Region Programme) still provide a valid framework and methodology for the desired activities. As such, work should take account of these existing studies and build upon and/or update their conclusions. The Norvision document looks towards 2020, hence future analyses should also cover this period and complement, rather than replace, this existing work.

#### **2.2.3 RELEVANT ESPON RESULTS TO BE CONSIDERED (max. 2000 characters)**

Given the broad remit of the proposal, the results of numerous ESPON projects are of relevance. From ESPON 2006, project 1.1.4 - Spatial Effects of Demographic Change and Migration; 1.2.1 - Transport Services and Networks: Territorial Trends and Supply; 3.3 - The Territorial Impact of the Lisbon/Gothenburg Process; 3.4.2 - EU Economic Policies and Location of Economic Activities; and many of the Policy Impact Projects could provide a useful foundation for the work in question (e.g. 2.1.5 - Fisheries). Many applied research projects carried out under the ESPON 2013 programme to date could also be useful bases for a study on the North Sea Region. In particular, "European seas in territorial development", DEMIFER, EDORA and ESPON Climate.

## **2.3 RESULTS AND OPERATIONAL USE OF THE PROJECT**

### **2.3.1 ANALYTICAL RESULTS ENVISAGED (max. 1000 characters)**

The proposal is being put forward to ensure that any future strategy for the North Sea region can be supported by a broad range of evidence and knowledge. As such, the analytical results envisaged would be an analysis of the potential impacts of demographic change on the economy and sustainability of communities in the North Sea region; an analysis of the contribution of maritime sectors to the economy and sustainability of communities in the North Sea region; an analysis of the accessibility of the North Sea region to markets and also the accessibility of different areas within the North Sea region to each other; an analysis of the effects of climate change on the coastline and economy of the North Sea region; an analysis of the environmental status of the North Sea. Comparative analyses of the above with other areas of the EU (particularly those with macro-regional strategies such as the North Sea and Baltic) could also follow on from this.

### **2.3.2 EXPECTED OPERATIONAL USE OF RESULTS BY THE STAKEHOLDERS (max. 1000 characters)**

The results will form the basis for a North Sea Strategy, building upon the existing Norvision document and aiming to implement the Integrated Maritime Policy and foster the sustainable economic development of the North Sea Region. Stakeholders are lobbying the European Commission to produce such a strategy and will be setting out their ideas of what should be included in the near future. It is anticipated that the results would initially help stakeholders to define the parameters for a strategy but could then in future assist the European Commission in the development of the strategy. There is also potential for the strategy to contribute to the development of a future INTERREG North Sea Region programme by identifying challenges and opportunities for development.

## **2.4 INVOLVEMENT OF PARTICIPATING STAKEHOLDERS**

### **2.4.1 DIRECT CONTRIBUTION FORESEEN**

Formal stakeholders would include a number of local and regional authorities from around the North Sea region. These stakeholders are looking to work in partnership with a wide range of stakeholders including Member States, the European institutions and bodies (Commission, Parliament and Committee of the Regions), the INTERREG North Sea Region Programme; international organisations (OSPAR) and industry (fisheries, transport, energy etc.) when developing a North Sea Strategy. As such, a wide range of authorities with responsibility for cohesion and regional development policies will be involved in the project and will be contributing to the analysis and the recommendations made, and provide access to relevant data and studies. A wide base of information, data and key strategic documents would therefore be made available to researchers.

### **2.4.2 DIRECT INVOLVEMENT OF PARTICIPATING STAKEHOLDERS**

The project will be led by Telemark County Council. The other participating stakeholders will come from Belgium, Denmark, France, Germany, the Netherlands, Norway, Sweden and the UK (TO BE IDENTIFIED). In addition, the CPMR's North Sea Commission would be involved in the project. The partners bring together a diverse range of local and regional politicians and policy experts to focus on issues affecting the North Sea. Depending on the level of commitment from the other stakeholders mentioned in 2.4.1., further experts could become involved in a holistic and cross-sectoral way. As such a pool of policy makers, practitioners and local experts would be available for consultation and discussion with researchers. It is envisaged that this would be carried out through virtual correspondence as well as dedicated meetings (physical or virtual).

## 2.5 PROJECT GOVERNANCE

1) It is envisaged that the participants would nominate members to the project Steering Committee and could act as a liaison between stakeholders and researchers. In addition, policy experts would be in regular contact with the research team and dedicated meetings could be held as and when appropriate. Political involvement would be achieved through the nominations to the Steering Committee and also through reporting to and consultation with the North Sea Commission's Executive Committee.

2) As stated, the CPMR's North Sea Commission would be the main vehicle through which to co-ordinate stakeholder involvement. The North Sea Commission is one of 6 geographical commissions of the CPMR and brings together some 50 regions from around the North Sea. The North Sea Commission has close ties with the INTERREG North Sea Programme Secretariat and has also been working closely with the Committee of the Regions' North Sea/English Channel Intercom Group on the development of a strategy.

## 2.6 DISSEMINATION ACTIVITIES

As part of its work in developing a North Sea Strategy, the organisation has set up a working group to focus on publicity of the work, stakeholder engagement and dissemination. As part of this group's remit, dissemination of the action's results would be achievable through dedicated seminars, stakeholder conferences and presence at Europe-wide events such as European Maritime Day. Key policy makers at all relevant levels of governance and in all applicable Member States would receive copies of any reports produced, as would policy makers in the European institutions. The development of a North Sea Strategy would be high profile in European terms and would therefore provide an opportunity for the wider dissemination and promotion of the findings. Long-term and open access to the results would be provided through the North Sea Commission's website.

## 2.8 EXPERIMENTAL AND INNOVATIVE CHARACTER OF THE PROPOSED ACTION (max. 1000 characters)
